Dear Brothers,

Happy New Year! Yes brothers, we are starting a new Columbian year on July 1st, 2020 and it will last until June 30th, 2021. In June your council elected new officers to lead during this Columbian year. Rest assured that with or without an Officer Installation Ceremony at midnight on July 1st they did become your new officers. I am working with the Supreme Council and the California State Council to be sure of how to do an online Officer Installation Ceremony and we'll put that in place ASAP.

There are some changes coming this year. One that I am aware of is that there is no longer an Insurance Member Quota for earning Star Council. But your council will need to hold one or more Fraternal Benefits Nights. As the details are ironed out I will pass them along.

One thing that we all need to be aware of is that the COVID-19 pandemic does not seem to be going away. I don't want to be a pessimist but I heard that the Spanish Flu pandemic took 15 months to resolve. If history repeats itself we have another year of online meetings, social distancing, and mask wearing to go. This leads to some special issues. The charities that we support are in desperate need of donations as their fundraising has been reduced just like our council's fund raising. So we Knights of Columbus need to step up and help them out. But our usual methods of raising funds won't work. We need new ideas. Please share them with your new officers and with me so that we can all get better.

We took delivery of 260 wheelchairs thanks to councils in our district. Distribution of these wheelchairs has begun already. If you know of a veteran than needs a wheelchair or you would like to help us distribute them please contact myself or the Orange Chapter Wheelchair Chairman, our very own District Warden, Brother John Blaney.

I want to also remind every brother Knight of Columbus what our mission is, "We are Catholic men building a bridge back to faith. There is much good and necessary work to be done in this world, and that's what Knights do every day." I ask you to look inside yourself to see if you

in fact are living our mission.

And with that mission I had a discussion with Brother Deacon Steve Greco, Spiritual Adviser for Council of the Rock in Irvine. Brothers, we are in the midst of a spiritual battle. The battle has existed for eternity and yet it seems that the fierceness of the battle is getting worse. 

FEAST DAYS-JULY 2020

St. Junipero Serra July 1, 2020



José Miguel Serra was born the son of a farmer in Spain in 1713. When he was 17, he joined the Franciscans and took the name Junípero. As a priest, he taught philosophy and theology. Then he requested to be a missionary.

In 1749, he sailed for Mexico. After landing in Mexico, Junípero and another friar walked 300 miles to Mexico City. On the way, Junípero was bitten on the leg by a poisonous insect. This leg caused him pain for the rest of his life. At the shrine of Our Lady of Guadalupe, Junípero dedicated his work to her.


In 1767, Junípero was made president of the 14 missions begun by Jesuits in Lower California. Then, when Spaniards took over Upper California in 1769, Junípero went with them. At age 56 and with his leg and foot swollen, he traveled the 900 miles on mule to San Diego, where he founded a mission. Junípero established 9 of the 21 Franciscan missions along the Pacific Coast and baptized a total of about six thousand Native Americans.

The missions were communities in which everything was held in common. The Native Americans were taught to grow crops and raise livestock. They learned to read, to sing, and to paint. They learned about the faith and asked to become Catholics.

Junípero once made the long trip back to Mexico City to meet with the military commander and establish rules to protect the Native Americans and the missions. Another time when an uprising left a Franciscan and several others dead, Junípero pleaded that the Native Americans held for the killings be released.

When Junipero was dying, he insisted on walking to the chapel for Holy Communion. He died on August 28, 1784. At his funeral, the weeping drowned out the singing. Junipero is called the father of California.

St. Thomas, Apostle: July 3, 2020



We feel great kinship for the apostle Thomas because, like him, most of us curiously combine faith and doubt. We sometimes share the enthusiasm St. Thomas expressed when upon Lazarus's death Jesus decided to go to Bethany. "Let's go too," Thomas said to the other disciples, "that we may die with him" (see John 11:16). But also like him we sometimes wonder where Jesus is headed and where he is taking us (see John 14:5).

However, we are most like Thomas because doubts occasionally rattle our brains and cloud our souls. So we all relate to the story of doubting Thomas (see John 20:25–29). Thomas was absent the first time Jesus appeared after his resurrection. The apostle swore he would not believe, "Unless I see in his hands the print of the nails, and place my finger in the mark of the nails and place my hand in his side" (v. 25RSV). Eight days later Jesus appeared again and told Thomas to touch his wounds. "My Lord, and my God," Thomas exclaimed, recovering his faith (v. 28)

Some early Christian writers criticized Thomas's faithless behavior. But others praised him for helping us cure our doubts, as Gregory the Great does in this homily:

"... For the faithlessness of Thomas aids us in our belief more than does the faith of the disciples who believed.... When he is brought to believe by feeling with his own hand, every doubt having been removed, our own mind is confirmed in faith... The divinity cannot be seen by any mortal man. So Thomas saw man and confessed him to be God, saying, "My Lord, and my God." On seeing, then, he believed, and proclaimed him to be God whomhe could not see.

Then Jesus spoke these words that give us much joy: "Blessed are they who have not seen and yet have believed" (seeJohn 20:29). This sentence undoubtedly signifies to us who hold in our minds him whom we have not seen in the flesh. But we are signified only if we follow up our faith by works. For he really believes who carries out in deed what he believes.

We do not know for sure where Thomas conducted his missionary activity after Pentecost. Some claim he evangelized among the Parthians. But a stronger tradition says he carried the gospel to India. He is supposed to have recruited the Christians of Malabar and died a martyr by the spear at Mylapore, near Madras. An ancient stone cross there marks the place where his remains lay buried until they were removed to Edessa in 394

Our Lady of Mt Carmel July 16, 2020



The Story of Our Lady of Mount Carmel: Hermits lived on Mount Carmel near the Fountain of Elijah in northern Israel in the 12th century. They had a chapel dedicated to Our Lady. By the 13th century they became known as "Brothers of Our Lady of Mount Carmel." They soon celebrated a special Mass and Office in honor of Mary. In 1726, it became a celebration of the universal Church under the title of Our Lady of Mount Carmel. For centuries the Carmelites have seen themselves as specially related to Mary. Their great saints and theologians have promoted devotion to her and often championed the mystery of her Immaculate Conception.

Saint Teresa of Avila called Carmel "the Order of the Virgin." Saint John of the Cross credited Mary with saving him from drowning as a child, leading him to Carmel, and helping him escape from prison. Saint Thérèse of the Child Jesus believed that Mary cured her from illness. On her First Communion day, Thérèse dedicated her life to Mary. During the last days of her life she frequently spoke of Mary.

There is a tradition—which may not be historical—that Mary ap peared to Saint Simon Stock, a leader of the Carmelites, and gave him a scapular, telling him to promote devotion to it. The scapular is a modified version of Mary's own garment. It symbolizes her special protection and calls the wearers to consecrate themselves to her in a special way. The scapular reminds us of the gospel call to prayer and penance—a call that Mary models in a splendid way.

"May the Mother of God, whom we remeber today with the title of Blessed Virgin of Mount Caramel, unparalleled in welcoming the Word of God and putting into practice, help us to purify our hearts and welcome the Lord's presence there." Pope Francis, Angelus, July 16, 2017

FEAST DAYS-JULY 2020

St. Mary Magdalene July 22, 2020



Mary Magdalene was one of Christ's disciples. She has been identified with several Marys in the Gospel: Mary, the sister of Martha and Lazarus; Mary, the sinner who washed Jesus' feet with her tears; Mary, a woman who cared for Jesus and his apostles on their journey. Today scholars believe that Mary Magdalene was not the sinful woman in Scripture although she has been confused with this unnamed woman for centuries.

Matthew, Mark, and John record that Mary of Magdala was present at the crucifixion of Jesus and that she was among the women who visited the tomb on Easter morning. Luke mentions her presence only at the tomb on Easter. According to John, Mary was specially privileged to see and speak to the risen Lord on Easter morning. She thought he was the gardener until he said her name.

So Mary Magdalene was near Jesus in his darkest hour and again in his most glorious hour. Moreover, she was an outstanding disciple of Jesus. Because Mary Magdalene was the one who brought the news of Jesus' resurrection to the apostles, she is called the Apostle to the Apostles. For centuries St. Mary Magdalene has been considered a model of complete generosity and of sincere sorrow for sin.

St. James, Apostle July 25, 2020



Saint James the Greater was one of the first apostles called by Jesus. At the time, James and his younger brother, John, were in a boat mending their fishing nets (Matthew 4: 18 - 2 2). The two responded without hesitation and were inseparable throughout Jesus' ministry.

The Gospels make it clear that James and John were, with Peter, the most trusted of Jesus' disciples. On certain occasions, Jesus called only Peter, James and John to accompany him. James was with Jesus at the Transfiguration, during the Agony in the Garden, and in the house of Jairus when Jesus raised Jairus' daughter to life. Acknowledging the zeal of James and John, the Lord called the brother Boanerges, or "sons of thunder". James also was the first apostle to shed his blood for Christ. He was martyred in A.D. 44 (Acts 12:2) in Jerusalem.

In the Catholic tradition, Saint James is the patron saint of Spain and, according to legend, his remains are held in Santiago de Compostela in Galicia. The traditional pilgrimage to the grave of the saint, known as the "Way of

St. James", has been the most popular pilgrimage for Western European Catholics from the Early Middle Ages onwards, although its modern revival and popularity stems from Walter Starkie's 1957 book, The Road to Santiago. The Pilgrims of St. James.[7] Officially 327,378 pilgrims registered in 2018 as having completed the final 100 km walk (200 km by bicycle) to Santiago to qualify for a Compostela

St. Ignatius of Loyola July 31, 2020



St. Ignatius lived in Spain during the sixteenth century. From the time he was a teenager, Ignatius had been a soldier. His life was full of adventure and excitement. He spent a lot of time in the palaces of dukes and princes. He was strong and full of life. Ignatius believed in God, but he didn't do much about his faith. He didn't do much more than go to Mass and say his prayers. He spent his spare time doing things that weren't exactly admirable. He used his time and his talents for his own glory and pleasure and not much else.

Ignatius had been living this way for a long time when one spring day he was fighting with an army of fellow Spaniards, and they were in a battle with the French. The French had taken all the land around the Spaniards except for one little spot. Ignatius and another soldier held on to that bit of land, which was high on a hill, inside a fort. Everyone else wanted to surrender because there was really no chance that they could win. Ignatius stood before the troops. He called out to his friends in a clear, strong voice. They couldn't surrender! They had the protection of the fort, and they had weapons. Why should they give up? So the troops listened to Ignatius and continued fighting against the French. It didn't work. They lost, and Ignatius was shot and wounded severely

He was strong and when doctors discovered that his leg had been set incorrectly and told him that unless his leg was rebroken and reset, he would never walk again. ¹When Ignatius's leg finally started to heal properly, he discovered two things. One of his bones was still sticking out, forming an ugly bump under his knee. And the leg that had been broken was now shorter than the other one. He insisted that the doctors saw off that ugly bump under his knee. He chained a cannonball to his short leg and spent hours each day letting it hang free, hoping the ball would stretch the leg back out to its normal size.

Spending all those months in his sickbed, Ignatius got bored. He asked for something to read. They brought him 2 books: One was a book about the life of Christ, and the other was a collection of saints' stories. Ignatius read these books. He was struck by the great sacrifices that the saints had made for God. He was overwhelmed by their love of Jesus. And Ignatius thought, "Why am I using my life just for myself? These people did so much good during their time on earth. Why can't !?" Ignatius decided that he would use the talents God had given him—his strength, his leadership ability, his bravery, and his intelligence—to serve God and God's people.

When Ignatius was all healed and ready to walk and travel again, he left his home to prepare for his new life. It wasn't easy. He was 30, which was considered old in those days, and he was getting a late start in his studies for the priesthood. Ignatius continued to travel. He gathered nine friends who felt the same way he did, and together they made a promise to God. They were the founders of the Company of Jesus, also called the Jesuits. In a few years they grew to over 1000 members, teaching and preaching the Gospel across the world.
