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Veteran's Day November 11, 2020



Veteran's Day 2020 will be on Wednsday, November 11 and is designated as a Federal Holiday. Veterans Day seeks to honor and give thanks to all the men and women who have served and are serving in the US Armed Forces. Ceremonies are held across the country at Veterans Hospitals, cemeteries, and National Monuments. At 11:00am EST, the Veterans Day National Ceremony is held at Arlington National Cemetary. At this ceremony the President of the United States, or his assigned ambassador, places a wreath on the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier.

Dear Brothers:

We thank the Lord for everything. In the month of November the four Sunday Mass Gospels are from the Book of Matthew, Chapter 25:1-46 and the Book of Mark, Chapter 13:33-37.

In the first Sunday's Gospel, Jesus tells his disciples "The kingdom of heaven will be like ten virgins who took their lamps and went out to meet the bridegroom...those who were ready went into the wedding feast with him... Therefore, stay awake, for you know neither the day nor the hour." The second Sunday's Gospel, Jesus tells his disciples the parable of a man who entrusts his servants with talents when he went on a journey.



When the man returns he tells the servant, who used his talents wisely, "Well done, my good and faithful servant". On the third Sunday, Jesus tells his disciples that the ones blessed by the Father will inherit the kingdom because "For I was hungry you gave me food. I was thirsty and you gave me drink, a stranger and you welcomed me, naked and you clothed me, ill and you cared for me, in prison and you visited me. The fourth Sunday, Jesus said to his disciples "Be watchful! Be alert!...you do not know when the Lord of the house is coming".

I think that these Gospels are asking us to be ready for the coming of the Lord by using the talents our Lord has given us, to feed the poor; to make every parishioner feel welcome, to help clothe the poor, to care for the ill, and to visit the imprisoned. I want to share a little insight with you. I was having an e-mail conversation with a friend that I hadn't talked to in a little while. The e-mail started out with them reporting to me the news about Pope Francis being in favor of same sex civil unions. We had some discussion about that but I am going to skip over that. There are many sources with better knowledge than I have where you can discover the meaning of what Pope Francis said and how it may or may not affect Church teachings.

But what did rock my world and has been on my mind since that conversation was this. My friend told me that their child had been murdered this summer. And now I find I must put on the armour of God, I am a part of the spiritual battle. So are you. We need a battle plan. We need to get ourselves to Confession. We need to invite other Catholic Gentlemen to join our order. Whether they join or not is between them and the Holy Spirit but as the Lord's foot soldiers we must invite them when we can. A saying that I picked up years ago from a brother Knight of Columbus is, "It's an invitation, not an obligation."

May the Lord bless you and your families. Reach out to your loved ones and let them know that you love them. Life on this earth is short and none of us know when it will end for any of us. Make sure that your families know that you love them just in case. Do what you can today, there may not be a tomorrow.



Feast Days-November 2020

The Commemoration of All the Faithful Departed (All Soul's Day) November 2, 2020




Catholics believe that death can separate people who they love from them for only a while. We are still united with them in the Communion of Saints. On this feast of All Souls, and throughout the entire month of November, we recall our deceased relatives, friends, and all the faithful departed who may yet be waiting for the full joy of heaven in purgatory. We pray for them, remembering that likewise these people being purified have the power to intercede us too.

The Church has encouraged prayer for the dead from the earliest times as an act of Christian charity. "If we had no care for the dead," Augustine noted, "we would not be in the habit of praying for them." Yet pre-Christian rites for the deceased retained such a strong hold on the superstitious imagination that a liturgical commemoration was not observed until the early Middle Ages, when monastic communities began to mark an annual day of prayer for the departed members.

In the middle of the 11th century, Saint Odilo, abbot of Cluny, France, decreed that all Cluniac monasteries offer special prayers and sing the Office for the Dead on November 2, the day after the feast of All Saints. The custom spread from Cluny and was finally adopted throughout the Roman Church.

The theological underpinning of the feast is the acknowledgment of human frailty. Since few people achieve perfection in this life but, rather, go to the grave still scarred with traces of sinfulness, some period of purification seems necessary before a soul comes face-to-face with God. The Council of Trent affirmed this purgatory state and insisted that the prayers of the living can speed the process of purification.

St. Leo the Great,
Pope and Doctor of
the Church
November 10, 2020




Only two popes have earned the title Great—Gregory I and Leo I. Leo was born in the beginning of the fifth century, probably in Rome. When he was a deacon, other church leaders looked to him for advice and for explanations of the faith. Leo was sent to settle arguments between leaders. He was on such a mission in 440 when he was elected pope. He helped the Church stay united when it was being attacked inside by false teachers and outside by warring tribes.

In 452, the Huns, led by Attila, marched toward Rome to destroy the city. Pope Leo went out to meet Attila and was able to stop him by agreeing to pay tribute to him every year. Three years later, another tribe marched on Rome—the Vandals, led by Genseric. Again Leo went out to meet the enemy, but this time, Leo was only able to stop the tribe from burning the city. For two weeks, the Vandals pillaged and looted Rome while the people sought shelter in the churches. Leo helped rebuild the city after the invaders departed, and he then sent missionaries to Africa to minister to those who had been captured and taken there by the Vandals.

Leo is often remembered for his writings and explanations of the faith, especially during the Council of Chalcedon in 451. His words were so powerful that the 600 bishops gathered there felt they had heard Saint Peter speaking through Leo. Pope Leo the Great died in 461"

Presentation of the Blessed Virgin Mary November 21, 2020



When Mary was asked to be the mother of the Savior, she was completely free to accept or reject the offer. Her response, "Let it be done to me," was a great act of faith. Because she did not understand what was happening, she must have known that there would be difficulties ahead.

She replied yes to the angel's announcement and agreed to become the mother of Jesus, and the Church has declared Mary to be the Mother of God. Because she was the first to say yes to the Messiah, the Church has declared her to be the Mother of the Church.

The feast of the presentation of Mary dates back to the 6th century in the East and the 15th century in the West. It is based on an ancient tradition that says Mary was taken to the temple in Jerusalem when she was 3-years-old and dedicated to God. What we celebrate on this day is the fact that God chose to dwell in Mary in a very special way. In response, Mary placed her whole self at the service of God. Every moment since your Baptism, God invites you to be open to his grace and dedicate yourself to him, as Mary did.

Feast Days And Important Dates -November 2020

Our Lord Jesus Christ King of the Universe November 22, 2020



On November 22nd as a Church, we conclude our liturgical year and celebrate the Feast of Christ the King. The Gospel we proclaim shows the great mystery of our faith: In the moment of his crucifixion, Jesus is shown to be King and Savior of all.

Luke's Gospel has been loaded with surprises: the poor are rich, sinners find salvation, the Kingdom of God is found in our midst. Here we see the greatest surprise of all. We are confronted with the crucified Jesus, whom faith tells us is King and Savior of all. The irony is that the inscription placed on the cross, perhaps in mockery, contains the profoundest of truth. As the leaders jeer, the thief crucified by his side recognizes Jesus as Messiah and King, and finds salvation.

Jesus is King, but not the kind of king we might have imagined or expected. His kingship was hidden from many of his contemporaries, but those who had the eyes of faith were able to see. As modern disciples of Jesus, we, too, struggle at times to recognize Jesus as King. Today's Gospel invites us to make our own judgment. With eyes of faith, we, too, recognize that Jesus, the crucified One, is indeed King and Savior of all.

Thanksgiving, celebrated on the fourth Thursday in November since 1941 due to federal legislation, has been an annual tradition in the United States by presidential proclamation since 1863 and by state legislation since the Founding Fathers of the United States. Traditionally, Thanksgiving has been a celebration of the blessings of the year, including the harvest. What Americans call the "Holiday Season" generally begins with Thanksgiving. Thanksgiving is celebrated both

with family and in public places with parades such as Macy's Thanksgiving Parade in New York City, ABC Dunkin' Donuts Thanksgiving Day Parade in Philadelphia, America's Hometown Thanksgiving Parade in Plymouth, Massachusetts, McDonald's Thanksgiving Parade in Chicago, and Bayou Classic Thanksgiving Parade in New Orleans. The first day after Thanksgiving Day "Black Friday" marks the start of the Christmas shopping season.

Thanksgiving is a wonderful holiday for any religion. Thanksgiving gives people a chance to reflect on why they are thankful. A Catholic Thanksgiving Holiday should be filled with thanks and love.

Spend a few minutes today talking with your family about what you are thankful for. Ask them why they are thankful this year. Sharing is an opportunity to learn about each other and worship God.

Give thanks and praise God. Before having Thanksgiving dinner, say grace and give thanks.

Advent 2020



1rst Sunday of Advent, November 29, 2020 2nd Sunday of Advent, December 6, 2020 3rd Sunday of Advent, December 13, 2020 4th Sunday of Advent, December 20, 2020

Beginning the Church's liturgical year, Advent (from, "advenire" in Latin or "to come to") is the season encompassing the four Sundays (and weekdays) leading up to the celebration of Christmas. The Advent season is a time of preparation that directs our hearts and minds to Christ's second coming at the end of time and also to the anniversary of the Lord's birth on Christmas. The final days of Advent, from December 17 to December 24, focus particularly on our preparation for the celebrations of the Nativity of our Lord (Christmas). Advent devotions including the Advent wreath, remind us of the meaning of the season. Our Advent calendar above can help you fully enter in to the season with daily activity and prayer suggestions to prepare you spiritually for the birth of Jesus Christ.

What each candle represents:

The first candle, which is purple, symbolizes hope. It is sometimes called the "Prophecy Candle" in remembrance of the prophets, especially Isaiah, who foretold the birth of Christ. It represents the expectation felt in anticipation of the coming Messiah.

The second candle, also purple, represents faith. It is called the "Bethlehem Candle" as a reminder of Mary and Joseph's journey to Bethlehem.

The third candle is pink and symbolizes joy. It is called the "Shepard's Candle," and is pink because rose is a liturgical color for joy. The third Sunday of Advent is Gaudete Sunday and is meant to remind us of the joy that the world experienced at the birth of Jesus, as well as the joy

that the faithful have reached the midpoint of Advent.

On the fourth week of Advent, we light the final purple candle to mark the final week of prayer and penance as we wait for the birth of our Savior. This final candle, the "Angel's Candle," symbolizes peace. It reminds us of the message of the angels: "Peace on Earth, Good Will Toward Men."

St. Andrew, Apostle November 30,2020



St. Andrew was a fisherman who lived in Galilee during the time of Jesus. He often followed John the Baptist and listened to his teachings. One day, John saw Jesus walking along the road. John said to his followers, "Behold the Lamb of God." He told his followers to go and talk to Jesus. He wanted them to know that Jesus was the One for whom they had been waiting. Andrew and another disciple followed Jesus and spent an afternoon with him. Early the next day Andrew found Simon Peter, his older brother, and told him, "We have found the Messiah."

Both men gave up their work as fishermen to become apostles of Jesus. Andrew was one of the first to be called. He seemed to take delight in bringing others to Jesus. Andrew was the one who told Jesus about the little boy who had the loaves of bread and the fish, the beginning of a meal that fed more than five thousand people. It was Andrew and Philip whom the Greeks approached when they wanted to see Jesus. These events indicate that Andrew was a man who was easy to approach, a man you could trust.

Like the other apostles, Andrew became a missionary. He preached about Jesus in the area around the Black Sea. Tradition tells us he preached in northern Greece, Turkey, and Scythia (now the southern part of Russia).

Andrew died as a martyr. Tradition says that in Patras in Greece he was tied to a cross shaped like the letter X. Ever since then, a cross in the shape of an X has been called St. Andrew's cross.

The name "Andrew" is a Greek name meaning "courageous" or "manly." St. Andrew lived up to his name.

The past two Saturdays we have been selling Christmas Cards and Advent Wreaths in the Church's lower parking lot from 10AM-2PM. Sales have been very slow with Knights making a majority of the purchases. We sold \$257 in Christmas Cards the first week and \$82.50 last week for a total of \$339.50. In past years we have averaged over a \$1000 in sales the first two weeks.

Over the past two weeks Nancy and Dave Edenhofer sold 12 Succulent Advent wreaths @ \$40 each for a total \$480. Nancy has indicated she is willing to make up 38 more wreaths, but at this time it doesn't look it will be necessary unless there is a significant surge in sales. They typically sell out in one week.

In normal times over four weekends we typically gross over \$3k for the council in our "Keep Christ In Christmas" promotion. All profit goes to funding the charities we support.



Using Venmo





Dear Brothers,

As more and more things go digital so too must the Knights and this council. We will start using Venmo as a form of payment for many things going forward such as membership dues, masks, and much more. Here is a tutorial put together by Brother Arnie on using Venmo. Thank you Brother Arnie!

Using Venmo

- 1- Download the Venmo app to your smart phone or tablet, such as an iPad from the APP Store or google play.
- 2- Click on join Venmo.
- 3- Fill in the info as requested; be sure and use a mobile number as you need to be able to receive text messages.
- 4- Use your email address to set up your account.
- 5- Use a password and write it down as you will need it for accessing your account.
- 6- Venmo will text you a code to verify your phone number and you will be prompted to input that code and send to complete setting up your account.
- 7- When setting up your profile, you may add a photo, if you wish but it is not required you can always come back and add the photo later.
- 8- Set up your payment method, need to use bank account information vs. credit card.
- 9- When asked, how you want to verify your bank account, it's best to do it instantaneously so you can begin using your account immediately otherwise if you choose verifying through the bank it takes 2-3 days for bank to verify account.
- 10- To verify your bank account, you will select your bank from the drop-down list; if your bank is not on the list, type in the name and it should come up.
- 11- It will prompt to sign on to your bank account, which you will do by using your credentials you use normally when you do your online banking.
- 12- Select the instant confirmation option.
- 13- You will receive a new code to confirm it's you and will be required to enter that code and send this is a different code from the one you used when you opened your Venmo account.
- 14- You will get confirmation within moments that your bank account has been verified and you will be able to use it immediately. You are ready to go!
- 15- At the bottom of your Venmo app screen you will see a link "pay or request" click on that.
- A new window appears where you can type in the payee, which is KnightsOfColumbus-StKilian and the name will come up, but if it does not, click on the link right below the line where you typed in the name, it says other people; at that point you should see a list of KOC chapters; be sure to select ours, there is a picture of St Kilian, the name of the church and the church building in the background.
- Type in the amount of payment you are sending and PLEASE be sure and type what the payment is for, i.e. dues, donation, mask, etc. this is critical for Brother Benny's accounting books.
- 18- Click send; this will open a new window reflecting your bank account last 4 digits; click on that to complete the payment.
- 19- When sending a payment Venmo may ask you for the last 4 digits of KOC phone number; type in 5033 which are the last 4 digits of Arnie Herrera's phone number.
- 20- You should get confirmation on the Venmo screen reflecting the payment details within moments.
- 21- When you make future payments to our KOC chapter, the name will already be on the Venmo list and will only need to click on it and simply make the new payment as described above.
- 22- Please note you can no longer send payments using your computer; must use mobile device.
